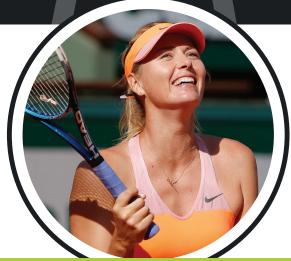

Maria Sharapova was born on April 19, 1987, in Nyagan, Russia. At 4 years old, she picked up her first tennis racket, and by age 6, tennis legend Martina Navratilova noticed her talent!

Sharapova's father believed in her so much that they moved to Florida so she could train at IMG Academy. There, Sharapova practiced with remarkable determination that set her apart from others.

Her hard work paid off in 2004 when 17-year-old Sharapova shocked the world by defeating Serena Williams to win Wimbledon. Nobody expected her to win—but Sharapova believed in herself!

Throughout her career, Sharapova won five major titles: Wimbledon, the US Open, the Australian Open, and Roland-Garros twice, completing a career Grand Slam. She also made history as the first Russian woman to reach the World No. 1 ranking! Sharapova was known for her strong backhand shot and powerful, aggressive serve. These key strengths made her difficult to beat on all types of tennis courts and helped her win major tournaments on grass, clay, and hard court surfaces.

Even when a serious shoulder injury threatened her career in 2008, Sharapova didn't give up. She had surgery and worked extremely hard during rehabilitation. Many people thought she would never win another major tournament, but Sharapova proved them wrong by winning Roland-Garros in 2012. That same year, she earned an Olympic silver medal. After another setback, she claimed her final major title at Roland-Garros in 2014.

Off the court, Sharapova showed the same competitive spirit in business. Nike signed her when she was just 11 years old! And in 2012, she created her candy company Sugarpova, which became very successful.

Sharapova retired in 2020 after winning 36 singles titles during her nearly 20-year career. Today, she runs her businesses, invests in health companies, and inspires young athletes worldwide. Throughout her life, Sharapova has shown that competitive spirit means always doing your best and never giving up, no matter what obstacles you face.
