(Courtesy of AP/Andrew Brownbill) As the most successful doubles team in ATP Tour history, twin brothers Bob and Mike Bryan were simply unstoppable! Together, they won an amazing 16 major titles. The Bryans won at least one major title together for 11 seasons in a row and held the record for weeks atop the ATP doubles world rankings at 438 weeks! In 2012, they completed the Career Golden Slam in doubles by capturing the gold medal at the London Olympics. But what made the Bryan brothers truly special wasn't just their victories—it was how they worked together as a team. Their success showed that when you combine talent with teamwork, amazing things can happen both on and off the court!

#### Fan Favorite

### World No. 1.

The Bryan brothers held the World No. 1 ranking jointly for a total of **438 weeks**.



#### 119 titles

The Bryan brothers won a record 119 titles together.





When you think of the Bryan brothers, one word comes to mind: teamwork. Bob and Mike Bryan weren't just legendary tennis players—they were the most successful doubles team ever. Together, they won an amazing 16 major titles, an Olympic gold medal, 119 ATP titles, and 1,100 matches.

Born on April 29, 1978, in Camarillo, California, Mike and Bob are identical twins. Mike is two minutes older than Bob, and there is one funny difference between them: Mike plays right-handed, while Bob plays left-handed!

The brothers started playing tennis early. At just 6 years old, they won their first doubles tournament together. They kept winning through their teenage years, including a US Open boys' doubles title in 1996. Then they went to Stanford University, where they won multiple NCAA titles at Stanford before turning professional in 1998.

On the professional stage, they quickly became fan-favorites and were known for how well they worked together on the court. They were a balanced duo, without any clear weaknesses. They favored net play, with both brothers often rushing the net, requiring top-notch teamwork to be successful.

Their teamwork led to incredible success. They won 16 majors together (6 at the Australian Open, 2 at Roland-Garros, 3 at Wimbledon, and 5 at the US Open), winning a major title for 11 consecutive seasons. They were ranked as the world's best team for 438 weeks, with a 139 consecutive week run. They also won an American record 25 Davis Cup ties as a pair and were part of the United States' 2007 Davis Cup championship team.

Although they have both added more major doubles titles to their resumes (Bob with 7 mixed doubles, Mike with 4 mixed and 2 men's doubles while Bob was injured), all of their biggest wins and most memorable moments stemmed directly from their unmatched teamwork.

In 2019, the Bryan brothers decided it was time to retire, and they played their final match in March of 2020. But they didn't stop being a team. They still work together to help young tennis players through their foundation and stay involved with the United States' Davis Cup team. In 2025, they were honored with a spot in the International Tennis Hall of Fame.
